About the course:

This class is for students with no or very limited background in Ukrainian. The course emphasizes oral communication while developing basic listening, reading and writing skills. The focus is on everyday communication and daily practices. Cultural information is integrated throughout the course materials.

By the end of the course, all students are expected to acquire a proficiency level of "Novice High" in listening, speaking, interaction, reading, and writing. They should be able to:

- (a) Communicate with others:
 - introduce themselves and others, talk their families, where they are from, where they live, what courses they are taking;
 - talk about interests and professions;
 - describe appearance;
 - discuss daily routines and leisure activities, weekend plans, holidays, travels and vacation.
- (b) Be able to:
 - ask everyday questions and engage in everyday conversations;
 - to produce greetings, make and respond to requests, apologize, express gratitude, ask for and give directions,
 - order food in a restaurant, buy groceries, clothes and train tickets, open bank accounts, visit a doctor, make arrangements with friends over the phone.
- (d) Be able to write texts in Ukrainian (hopefully in 'cursive' ©)
 - emails;
 - letters;
 - film reviews;
 - forum comments.
- (e) Be able to understand simple audio and video texts (such as TV ads and cartoons).

Method

This intensive course incorporates the Communicative Language Teaching approach along with a blended learning format: a combination of group activities with online sessions which students complete independently.

Program Structure:

This class is divided into two sessions. The first session covers the material normally included in the fall semester. The second covers the material normally included in the winter semester.

You will receive two grades, one for each session.

Session I: May 28—June 19 (final exams on June 19)

Session II: June 20—July 12 (final exams on July 11-12) *July 12 will be a half day.

Auditing and Incompletes:

Since CLI courses are tuition free, they **cannot be taken for audit**. There is no not-for credit option. All students will receive a grade for their class. CLI does not issue grades of **Incomplete**. Students who do not complete coursework by the end of CLI will be graded normally, with a grade of zero for any assignment not completed.

Class Time versus Homework:

This intensive course relies heavily on independent student work and you should plan to spend **four hours a day** on homework and review outside of class.

Class time combines both group and individual work. The group work concentrates on active listening and reading tasks, speaking and interactional activities that involve communicative and language games, discussions, simulations and role-plays, etc. Through individual work students will be engaged into writing, watching, reading, listening activities as well as activities that emphasize vocabulary and grammar review and practice.

Students will be expected to **read ahead** and to **work with material that has not yet been covered in class**. It is their responsibility to learn assigned material before class, then come to class prepared to apply what they have learned. Instructors will not necessary go over every homework topic in class. Instead, they will concentrate on topics that are particularly difficult or particularly important. Nonetheless, students are responsible for mastering every topic assigned, **including topics not emphasized in class**.

With a course moving at 5 times the usual speed, preparation is critical. Students who come to class unprepared will find it difficult to succeed.

Participation:

Since the course relies so heavily on listening and speaking practice, attendance and participation are mandatory and count toward your final grade.

Class participation will reflect your daily preparation and active participation in class discussions. A student who is chronically late to class, leaves early, or is not prepared to participate will not receive full attendance and participation credit.

Students who miss more than **two classes** over the course of the 7-week session **without prior consent** of the instructor or CLI administration will **receive a zero** for class participation and will be asked to **withdraw** from the course.

Homework Grading:

Homework is an opportunity to practice new structures. It is expected to make mistakes. However, students will not be marked down for doing so. As long as students complete their homework and turn it in on time, they will receive full credit.

Academic Dishonesty:

Academic honesty is expected of all students in all examinations, papers, laboratory work, academic transactions and records. The possible sanctions include, but are not limited to, appropriate grade penalties, course failure (indicated on the transcript as a grade of E), course failure due to academic dishonesty (indicated on the transcript as a grade of XE), loss of registration privileges, disqualification and dismissal.
