THE CHONCOFF LECTURE

On January 29, Dr. Jane Miljovski gave the annual Mary Choncoff Lecture in the new Lattie Coor Building. Dr. Miljovski, an economics professor in the faculty of law at UKIM, spoke on the process of privatization in Macedonia.

In addition to the lecture, Dr. Miljovski is also this semester's UKIM exchangee. His primary goal was to study the processes of transition and the field of International Political Economy in former socialist countries from the perspective of American economists.

Dr. Miljovski used his stay to learn about teaching methods at American universities. Macedonian universities are now undergoing a serious transition. He is an evaluator for this process and he studied American methods of evaluating institutions of higher education.

Dr. Miljovski also investigated new possibilities of collaboration between ASU and UKIM.

CRITICAL LANGUAGES INSTITUTE

The CLI is looking forward to a summer with record enrollments. As of our April 30 deadline, more than 50 students have registered for 2004 courses. This summer we are offering five languages at the elementary level (Albanian, Armenian, BCS, Macedonian, and Polish) and two at the intermediate level (Armenian and BCS). There are still seats in all classes, so we encourage you to apply.

The CLI is pleased to introduce our instructors for 2004:

Linda Meniku - AlbanianLinda joins us for a second summer to teach the elementary Albanian course and coordinate the Tirana practicum. We are excited to have Linda back at ASU this summer, as her enthusiasm last year lead to nearly half of her students returning with her to Tirana for the three-week practicum. Linda currently teaches at the University of Tirana.

Siranush Khandanyan - Elementary ArmenianSiranush received her degree in English Philology, Linguistics from the Faculty of Romance and Germanic Languages at Yerevan State University where she is currently an instructor of English. In addition to instructing the elementary Armenian class, she will lead the Yerevan practicum.

Margarita Sekoyan - Intermediate ArmenianRita is currently the Language Program Coordinator at the US Embassy in Yerevan where she teaches both Armenian and Russian to embassy personnel. She will teach the intermediate Armenian course.

Danko Sipka - Elementary BCSFor the fifth consecutive summer Danko will teach the BCS 101/102 class. Danko has strengthened the BCS course offerings with the introduction of BCS 201/202 during the academic year and the test run of his on-line elementary BCS option this summer.

Zlata Filipovic - Intermediate BCS Zlata was born in Bosnia/Hercegovina and received her degree in BCS language and literature from the University of Sarajevo. Last November, she and Danko were co-instructors in an intensive Bosniac language and culture program at ASU sponsored by the US military. She is currently working for the Phoenix Union High School District at Central High School.

Lupco Spasovski - MacedonianLupco, a Ph.D. candidate in English at ASU, will again teach the elementary Macedonian course. He will be a faculty associate in the Department of English during the 2004-2005 academic year.

Agnieszka Mielczarek - PolishAgnieszka will instruct the first CLI Polish class. She graduated from the Faculty of Polish at the Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznan, Poland where she also earned a Ph.D. in Polish linguistics. She currently works at the Polish Language School for Foreigners.

The Critical Languages Institute has offered instruction in languages of Eastern Europe and Eurasia since 1991. During the past thirteen years, over 250 students have completed either elementary or intermediate language instruction. This is an impressive achievement that we look to improve over the next few years. To that end, we have revamped the CLI so that classes meet Mondays through Fridays from 8 until 12 with mandatory cultural activities in the afternoon three times a week.

STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMS

Our list of study-abroad opportunities continues to grow. In addition to our longstanding programs at the University of Ss. Kiril and Metodij in Skopje, Macedonia and Kazan State University in Kazan, Tatarstan (Russian Federation), we now have semester and academic-year programs in Albania, Armenia, Serbia & Montenegro, and Poland.

The program at Yerevan State University in Armenia began in fall 2002. This fall we will begin programs at the University of Tirana (Albania), Adam Mickiewicz University (Poland), and the University of Novi Sad (Serbia & Montenegro).

Our study abroad programs are closely linked to the Critical Languages Institute, which provides the language training necessary for serious study in these countries. These programs are designed for undergraduate and graduate students. They are attractive for both their concentrated courses of language study and their flexibility. Students looking to complete undergraduate and graduate theses on topics concerning the Balkans, East Europe, and Eurasia would find these programs particularly useful. In addition, we work closely with students as they apply for external fellowships and grants (i.e. NSEP fellowships) to fund their study-abroad.

Applications are due March 15 for the fall semester (or academic year) and October 15 for the spring semester. We encourage you to help us identify potential students for these programs.

ASU-YEREVAN STATE UNIVERSITY LINKAGE

The U.S. Department of State Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs funded a three-year project, "Refashioning the Social Sciences and Practitioner Training in Public Administration: International Collaboration Between Arizona State University (USA) and

Yerevan State University (Armenia)." The first five visiting scholars and three university administrators will arrive in August to participate in an university orientation. The visiting faculty will remain for the fall semester, meeting with faculty in the School of Public Affairs, auditing classes, developing syllabi, and interacting with public and private sector colleagues. A degree program in the field of public administration is being developed at YSU. During their semester here, the scholars will develop curricular materials for use in new classes that will be introduced in Yerevan as part of that new degree program.
